In 2003, Sister Mary Alma celebrated her 50th anniversary as a Sister of Charity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. She currently lives in Chicago in a two-flat occupied by BVMs. Her two housemates of 30 years were also colleagues at Mundelein and Loyola.

Retirement has allowed Sister Mary

Alma to serve the BVMs in the Great Lakes area as editor of a regional newsletter and to write for **SALT** magazine (published by the BVMs). Her hobbies include gardening in her small but manageable yard, painting and poetry. Sister Mary Alma recently created lyrics for two hymns featured at the BVM 175th Jubilee Celebration in June 2008.

**Sister Mary Nolan, BVM
Class of '58**

One of my favorite memories of us as freshmen was our volley ball cheers, "We are the tip topper team you see, we play volleyball at OLP, we're so quick and sharp at play we hope to win most every day..." The good team spirit that began then continues today.

I entered the Sisters of Charity and received the name Patricia Mary, BVM, in honor of my older sister Pat (OLP charter class of '55). I knew I was called to love and serve God in this way of life but I didn't know it would be 50 extraordinary years of growing and learning, always in process.

After graduating from Mundelein College in Chicago, I was challenged and deepened when I put my B.A. degree to the test and taught primary grades in Iowa and New York. After receiving my M.A. in Religious Education, I served as a Director of Religious Education and/or Pastoral Associate in parishes in Minnesota, Mississippi, Colorado, Texas and Missouri. This journey widened my circle of special friends to include Hispanics and African Americans. Their roots run deep and they enriched my life.

Recently I had the privilege and responsibility of serving the Sisters in my BVM community as the elected Regional Representative for the South Central area. As my frequent flyer

miles grew and the tires wore down on the Toyota Prius, I came to know and love 300 sisters in a unique way. Whether active or retired, their lives speak to me about BVM core values that began 50 years ago at OLP, namely Justice, Charity, Freedom and Education.

This year as I celebrate my Golden Jubilee, I am deeply grateful for people, prayer, poetry and nature which daily shape my journey. Don't you think our school song lives on in each one of us?

Fifty years have passed since my graduation from OLP. The memories are many and dear to my heart.

I can recall how excited I was to attend this school as it was a new addition to Catholic high school education in the Twin Cities. The sisters were excellent teachers and a lot of fun. They were very patient with us as teenagers. Being class treasurer in my Senior year provided me with an opportunity to be involved in fundraising activities for our many events.

Presently I am living in Inver Grove Heights, Minnesota and working part-time with the restorative justice program. It is a program aimed in bringing victim, offender and community together for reconciliation and accountability. Together with this program, I journey

with women incarcerated and have co-authored a book titled, **Building a Home for the Heart**, which highlights the use of circles for healing.



**Sister Letitia Close, BVM (St. Noel)
1964-1970**

Often during the '90s and since, I've thought that the decade of the "60s" was only yesterday! When I began to teach in 1963, I was assigned to LaSalle High School in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. I must have been a terrific success, because in 1964 I was assigned to teach at Our Lady of Peace High School in St. Paul, Minnesota.

I was nervous about teaching at OLP. It had a reputation in the BVM Community as a great school. OLP was an unforgettable experience for me. I quickly grew to love the students and the faculty of OLP. By the time I retired from OLP, I had developed no reputation as a teacher, but what I did develop was a freedom to take risks. Sometimes we called that "following the Spirit." That freedom to take risks has been my life story since leaving OLP.

On August 2, I will be 50 years a member of the Sisters of Charity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. I chose to enter the BVMs when I was nine years old. I was inspired by the BVMs who taught at Our Lady of Lourdes in Chicago during the '40s and '50s. Before them, I was inspired by the faith and the perseverance of my parents, both natives

of Ireland. They loved the USA and they loved freedom. In their youth they knew persecution and ridicule for their religion and language. Times hardly change at all, it seems. Looking back, I believe that their spirit of justice influenced me.

Before leaving St. Paul in 1997, I apprenticed in a program for drug and alcohol dependent boys. Eventually, I influenced that agency to establish a similar resource for female teens. While serving there with another OLP graduate, I had the experience of working with the county mental health center to figure out programs and funding for our fledgling agency. Our "contracts" with the federal and local government experienced government rule changes every six months. Meanwhile I joined a local social services association comprised of the CEOs of about 18 non-profit agencies in Minnesota. From my association with this group of people, I received encouragement, information, professional interest and respect. I drew a lot of peace from them as well.

An essential part of my "education-on-the-go" was night classes at the University of Minnesota's School of Public Health. It had initiated a program to train and to certify persons to work in a new field "chemical dependency."

From St. Paul I went to Chicago and began an agency to bring assistance to nuns with "chemical dependency." I did this with the help of four other BVM Sisters who were similarly trained. To this day, one of those BVMs and I continue this mission to nuns who are addicted to alcohol, medication/drugs, food, spending, and gambling. This has been my path to helping women achieve freedom and value in their lives.
